ABOUT THE CONCERT

The cyclical nature of seasonal change provides contrasting characteristics (light vs. dark, warm vs. cold, energetic vs. lethargic, etc.) that are often shaped into powerful dramatic narratives in art and literature. The history of music abounds with references to the seasons ranging from large-scale masterworks such as Vivaldi's *Four Seasons* and Stravinsky's *The Rite of Spring* to jazz standards such as *Autumn Leaves* and *Summertime*. This program presents a variety of compositions that are associated with the seasons in some way, either through direct reference or my own subjective interpretation.

The fanfares in *September: The Hunt*, the colorful gestures in *Reflections on an Autumn Sky* and the haunting complexity of *Autumn in Warsaw* represent Fall.

The waltz rhythms in *December: Christmas*, the nostalgic *As I Walk Onward, the Falling Snow Fills in My Footsteps*, and the powerful drama of Chopin's *Winter Wind Étude* represent Winter.

The lyrical melody of *To Spring*, the energetic sound world of *Rejuvenated* and Tatum's dazzling version of *All the Things You Are* represent Spring.

The serene Summer's Eve, Bill Evans' marvelous interpretation of On A Clear Day You Can See Forever and the rippling arpeggios in Jeux d'eau represent Summer.
